About the AEPJ

The European Association for the Preservation and Promotion of Jewish Culture and Heritage (AEPJ), an NGO created in 2004, is a network of European institutions, including public bodies, private foundations, federations of Jewish communities and NGO's, that serves as a platform to develop cultural initiatives and educational programs to European Jewish sites. The AEPJ network acts as a channel for intercultural dialogue and promoting better knowledge and understanding of European history, creating awareness of cultural diversity and strengthening European citizens' cultural identity.

The AEPJ serves as an organisational umbrella to welcome, promote, train and help develop unique Jewish cultural and heritage projects of excellence around Europe. A community, a network and a meeting point of professionals working in the field of Jewish Heritage. The AEPJ helps organisations develop their programs, offers training in the field of Jewish cultural tourism and exchange of good practices and promotes the development of transnational programs.

With a heritage approach in line with the Council of Europe, with its integrated and cross-disciplinary approach to cultural heritage and diversity, the AEPJ promotes fundamental European values of human rights, cultural diversity and intercultural dialogue seeking to bring the Jewish heritage closer to all European citizens, involving them in the production, circulation and conservation of Jewish culture and heritage.

The AEPJ is formed by the following member organizations:



Bnai Brith Europe

B'nai B'rith Europe is a Jewish association that is present in 28 countries. B'nai B'rith means "Son of the Alliance" - the concept of alliance is a key concept in the Bible and in Judaism - and it has non-governmental organisational status.

Its role is to fight racism, xenophobia and anti-semitism; to support the State of Israel; to help the needy; to promote Jewish identity; to strengthen the knowledge about the Jewish presence in Europe through culture and heritage; to encourage and train young Jewish adults for leadership in the Jewish communities.



Patronat Call de Girona

The Patronat is responsible for the physical and cultural restoration of the Jewish heritage in Girona, in-

cluding the renovation, revitalization and promotion of the historic Jewish Quarter, named Call. The Museum of Jewish History and the Nahmanides Institute for Jewish Studies are the two main bodies.



Rede de Judiarias de Portugal

Rede de Judiarias de Portugal (Portuguese Network of Jewish Quarters) is a public association ruled by private

law, with the intention to act jointly to defend the urban, architectural, environmental, historical and cultural heritage in connection with the Jewish heritage. It is formed by 28 municipalities and 5 Touristic regions.



Diputació de Lleida

The Diputació de Lleida is a county council institution that has its reason for being in the town councils of the Region of Lleida, Catalonia. Presided over since 2011 by Joan Reñé, the corporation jointly with the L'Institut d'Estudis Ilerdencs, and the Tourism Board, create a project under the moto "Perseguits i Salvats". This project recovers and indicates the four itineraries used around 80,000 refugees to escape the Nazis in the World War II, it is estimated that about 20,000 were Jewish. This initiative coincides with the recovery of the Chemin de la Liberté (liberty road), route of evasion that joined the French Department of Ariège with the region of Pallars Sobirà, The routes are about 150 km. distributed around different regions in France and Spain Pyrenees.



Agudath Israel in Moldova

Observer member

Agudath Israel Jewish orthodox community in Moldova is situated in a historical building of the Hay synagogue and "Sinai" Yeshiva in Chisinau constructed in 1886. Agudath Israel has been realizing its activities in the republic for over 30 years. The core activities include celebrating Jewish holidays, keeping traditions, learning Torah, educational programs for children, summer camps, classes of Hebrew, production of kosher food, welfare assistance to the needy. The programs in total embrace over 700 people in the three biggest centers of the country – Chisinau, Balti and Tiraspol.



Azerbaijan Tourism Board

Azerbaijan Tourism Board is in charge of regulation of the activities, development of tourism, and the promotion of Azerbaijan as a destination. Core tasks of ATB include managing Azerbaijan's destination

brand, innovative marketing in the most internationally promising markets, and transferring our knowledge of guests and markets to the domestic tourism industry. Since 2016 joined the AEPJ and they work in a specific itinerary through Jewish local sites.



Burgenländische Forschungsgesellschaft - Research Society Burgenland (BFG)

The Burgenländische Forschungsgesellschaft - Research Society Burgenland (BFG) was founded in 1987 as a regional research and educational institution at the interface between science and adult education. Its goal is the advancement of education, science and research in a structurally weak, rural and peripheral border region. Research and educational work in regional context are therefore constitutive elements of what the BFG does.

As a regional research institute, the BFG supports institutions and decision-makers in Burgenland in analyzing, developing and preparing current topics in the areas of education, culture and society and acts as an important interface to national and European educational policy discussion and research. The research results are published in the form of publications, studies or project reports and communicated to experts, politicians, multipliers and the media through symposia, conferences, workshops or websites.

In the field of contemporary history and civic education, the BFG's expertise lies in the history of Judaism in Burgenland. In this context and next to other projects, the BFG has organized and coordinated the European Days of Jewish Culture in Burgenland since 2014.



CoopCulture

CoopCulture is a cooperative operating in the heritage and cultural activities sector in Italy. CoopCulture is a qualified partner positioned to offer answers and solutions to the increasingly complex needs of a continuously evolving

sector, from the perspective of integration between cultural heritage and territory and between culture, tourism and local economy. With the intention of bringing diverse audiences closer to art, it has developed user paths differentiated by language and method, taking advantage of the potentials offered by new technologies and paying special attention to local communities in all of their aspects, families, young people, children, the elderly and immigrant communities.



Coordination Committee of the Jewish Communities in the Republic of Croatia

The Coordination Committee of the Jewish Communities in the Republic of Croatia brings together nine of Croatia's historic Jewish communities (JC Čakovec, Daruvar, Dubrovnik, Koprivnica, Osijek, Rijeka, Slavonski Brod, Split & Zagreb). In 1992, the CCJCRC convened a meeting of Jewish historic communities in the Republic of Croatia, and in 1995, the Coordination was formed to represent the common interests of nine historical communities and to strengthen their autonomy and identity.



Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic

The Federation of Jewish Communities in the Czech Republic (FJC) is an umbrella organisation represent-

ing 10 Czech Jewish Communities and other independent Jewish institutions across the Czech Republic.

FJC coordinates the activities of the Jewish communities' especially in religious, social, educational and cultural aspects. FJC works with Czech government institutions, state administration, local authorities, or other Czech institutions. FJC also functions and cooperates with foreign institutions and organisations.

FJC actively monitors the environment against all manifestations of anti-Semitism, racism, xenophobia, fascism or any other discrimination. Federation protects the memory of Shoah victims. FJC preserves and maintains the Jewish monuments in the Czech Republic, promotes the Jewish culture and heritage, educates the young people and provides care for the elderly, funds Jewish needs and supports Israel.



Grodzka Gate - NN Theatre- Shtetl Routes

The idea of the Shtetl Routes arose from the documentary, artistic and educational work connected to the Jewish heritage of Lublin as part of the work of "Grodzka Gate – NN Theatre" Centre (Ośrodek "Brama Grodzka – Teatr NN"), Lublin-based municipal cultural institution dealing with education and cultural heritage since 1992. The Centre's work draws on the symbolic and historical significance of the building where it is located – the Grodzka Gate, which was once a passage way between the Christian and Jewish quarters, as well on Lublin's position as the meeting point of various cultures, traditions, and religions.



Haggadah Association

Haggadah Association is a non-profit organisation for preserving and promoting jewish culture and tradition in Balkan and Bosnia and Herzegovina was established to preserve and promote Jewish culture and tradition. Haggadah is dedicated to promote and preserve this heritage and to disseminate information about Balkan-Bosnian Jewish culture and heritage.

Our duty is to educate tourist guides to be able to lead the Tour «Jewish Sarajevo», Jewish Mostar and Jewish Balkan tour.

Haggadah offer new destination to preserve good memories on Bosnian's Jews: Visit original manuscript Sarajevo's Haggadah, Pilgrimage to Stolac on the TZADIK grave Rabbi Moshe Danon, Old Jewish cemetery—with specific tombstones, Bosnian Sephardic cuisine. HAGGADAH tries to preserve Sarajevo's reputation as The European Jerusalem.



Israeli House

The Israeli House NET (NGO) was established in 2013 in Tbilisi and works to achieve solidarity by public

diplomacy and enhance the cooperation between Israel and friendly states among them Georgia. One of the important goals is to promote the Jewish Heritage, and present it a bridge between Georgia, Israel and the World Jewry, and also to promote the remembrance of the Holocaust. At the Israeli House NET, lectures on topics related to Israel and Jewish Culture and Heritage are conducted regularly. Also, meetings, exhibitions, presentations and seminars are organized in the cultural, economic, business, technological or political spheres. The organization's Advisory Board includes international

representatives: diplomats, leading businessmen, heads of the international organizations, academic staff and public figures. The initiator of the organization is Itsik Moshe, the president of the Israel-Georgia Chamber of Business.



The Jewish Community Foundation of Izmir

Izmir in Turkey is the only city

in which an unusual cluster of Synagogues bearing a typical architectural style dating from the 16th century are preserved. These Synagogues built by decedents of Jews who were deported from Spain & Portugal are an historical architectural complex which is unique in the world.

The aim of the Izmir Project is to turn the compound of these ancient Synagogues into a Jewish Heritage Museum, which will tell the story of Sephardic Jews expelled from Spain and arrived in the Ottoman Empire. This future museum will expose the mutual influence of Jewish and Muslim cultures and the intercultural dialogue between them.

This hopefully restored complex of Synagogues was confirmed in Izmir city-plan, as the future Jewish Museum of Izmir, and we at the Kiriaty foundation are working closely with Izmir Municipality and the local Jewish community to realise, and promote it.



Journées Européennes de la Culture et du Patrimoine Juifs - France

The association "Journées Européennes de la Culture et du Patrimoine Juifs – France" (JECPJ-

France) is dedicated to promote and preserve this heritage and to disseminate information about French Jewish culture. For 15 years, JECPJ-France has contribute to the European Day of Jewish Culture in various French Regions (Alsace, Centre, Lorraine, Nord-Pas de Calais, Paris, Provence-Côte d'Azur, Sud-Ouest), welcoming each year thousands of visitors from all backgrounds and beliefs. JECPJ-France is also part of the European program developing the "Jewish Heritage Routes"



Jewish Cultural Heritage Route Association

Jewish cultural heritage route association has been established in December, 2015 by the agreement between Joniškis, Kėdainiai and Ukmergė municipalities, Mu-

seums` Association and Centre for Studies of Culture and History of East European Jews. Association seeks to: 1. to preserve and present a numerous heritage of Lithuanian Jewish culture, which is in the territories of different municipalities, while creating Jewish cultural heritage routes both on regional and national levels; 2. to encourage regional interests about Jewish culture, traditions and heritage, to promote visiting and presenting objects related to Jewish history; 3. to contribute to both national and international dissemination of unique historical, cultural and intellectual heritage of Litvaks. At this moment Association has 13 members, 8 of them are municipalities and the rest of them - public institutions and funds, working on the promotion of Jewish heritage.



Supporting Cultural, Art & Educational Projects

Kiriaty Foundation International

The Mordechai Kiriaty Foundation is a philanthropic non-profit N.G.O., that has encouraged and supported humanitarians educational and cul-

tural institutions. The Foundation has initiated two major ventures and supports them: The Peace Academy which focuses on teaching peace studies in Israel, and the Izmir Project which focuses on preservation of the historic synagogues in Izmir-Turkey, and establishing a Jewish Museum.



Lithuanian Jewish Community

Lithuanian Jewish Community is an association of seven regional/local communities and twenty other Lithuanian Jewish active organizations. The aim of LJC are to bring together all the Lithuanian Jews, to defend and

look out for their interests in Lithuania and abroad, preserve and celebrate Jewish traditions, cultural and historical heritage, to keep the memory of the Holocaust victims alive, to promote tolerance and fight anti-Semitism and to build and nurture various relations and connections with Jewish and Litvak organizations and individuals all over the world.



Red de Juderías de España - Caminos de Sefarad

Red de Juderías de España (Network

of Spanish Jewish Cities) is a non-profit public association created in 1999 with the goal of protecting the urban, architectural, historical, artistic and cultural Sephardic heritage in Spain. It is a cultural and tourist network that brings together 24 member town (Ávila, Barcelona, Cáceres, Calahorra, Córdoba, Estella-Lizarra, Hervás, Jaén, León, Lucena, Monforte de Lemos, Oviedo, Palma, Plasencia, Ribadavia, Segovia, Tarazona, Toledo and Tudela). Each of these towns has highlighted its ancient Jewish heritage and manages a programme of events, tours, and training.



Tarbut Sighet Foundation

Fundatia Tarbut Sighet Culture si Educatia Iudaica was Established in 2014 following the 70th Anniversary to the Jewish May 1944 deportations. A yearly Gathering for Sighet – Maramorish Region descendants

from all over the world, took place in 2014 and 2015, providing a commemoration and celebration event.

Tarbut Sighet Foundation has put forth two major missions since its establishment:

To provide information to all Maramures Jewish generations about the history of the Jews pre- and post-Holocaust. And, producing and staging cultural Jewish programs teaching about the Jewish Heritage and history of the Jews in Maramures pre- and post-Holocaust, at regional high schools, libraries, community centers, theatres and at Jewish synagogues. This will result in a better understanding of the past in order to have a better relationship with the local and the World Jewry. One of the main goals of FTS is to promote Jewish Heritage in Maramures Region (Northern Transylvania), taking place at high schools, libraries, community centers, and theatres as well as at local city halls etc.



Taube Center for Jewish Life & Learning

Taube Center for Jewish Life & Learning is dedicated to enriching Jewish life in Poland and to connecting Jews from around the world with their East European heritage. Through heritage tours, educational, and cultural programs in

Poland, supporting Jewish studies, publishing, the arts and media, it strengthens Polish Jewish literacy and cultivates global knowledge of a living Polish Jewish heritage drawing on its complex and historically rich legacy. The Center is partnered with organizations in Poland, Israel, Europe, and the United States.



The Together Plan

The Together Plan is a UK charity dedicated to the rehabilitation, repair and revival of Jewish communities

coming out of collective trauma in the former Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, enabling, rather than providing, through a self-help approach.

In spite of the traumatic past, there are many who yearn to reconnect with their lost identity. It is the mission of The Together Plan charity, to help those Jews Still living in the region learn how to rebuild their communities, and also to reconnect those in the diaspora to their ancestry and the homes they left behind. The Together Plan is playing a vital and much needed role in the repair and renewal process for a better connected and meaningful Jewish future for Jews everywhere.



Travel to Live

Travel to Live is a tour operator and travel company based in Transylvania / Banat, in the city of Timisoara, one of the most vibrant centers of multiculturalism in Europe. Jewish life in

this part of the world left an important impact on the economics and social fabric of the cities.

One of our important missions is to promote Jewish heritage in Transylvania to people all over the world, Jews and non-Jews alike, but also to raise the awareness locally of past and present Jewish presence. We are building and developing a network of museums, institutions, NGOs and professionals who are actively involved in revealing, promoting and preserving Jewish heritage in all important centers of Jewish life and history in Transylvania.



Unione delle Comunità Ebraiche Italiane

The UCEI is a non-profit organisation representing 21 Jewish communities in Italy, whose millennia presence in the country have contributed

to enriching its cultural, artistic and social heritage. The main purpose of the UCEI is to promote the unity of the Italian Jewish community ensuring its development in religious, spiritual, cultural and social areas. UCEI represents the Jewish community before the State, the Government and other authorities, as well as the general public in all matters regarding Jewish interests. The UCEI recognises that the State of Israel plays a central role in contemporary Jewish identity, and therefore also works to strengthen relations with Israel, and represents Italian Judaism within international organisations.



Waddesdon Mannor

In 1874 Ferdinand de Rothschild bought the Waddesdon estate and commissioned French architect, Gabriel-Hippolyte Destailleur, to build a country house to entertain friends and family. The project was immense; the hill-top on which the

house stands was levelled, drives and terraces were cut and the grounds landscaped and planted with mature trees. Ferdinand, like other members of his family, was an avid collector. Waddesdon is renowned for its superb collections in what became known as 'the Rothschild style' – English 18th-century painting combined with French decorative arts. Today, still managed by the family on behalf of the National Trust, it is a vibrant expression of Rothschild spirit, with thriving programmes of events and activities, changing exhibitions and growing collections of contemporary art and architecture.



World Jewish Travel

The World Jewish Travel, Inc. is a non-profit organization established in 2011. The WJT mission is to preserve Jewish heritage worldwide and promote tourism to a variety of sites and cultural events around the world

that are of great importance to the Jewish heritage continuity. WJT stand up for our heritage, giving it back its long-lost voice, in honor of past generations, and in favor of those to come. To do so, WJT have developed an integrated ecosystem, bringing together heritage, travel and technology, via an innovative, first-of-its-kind platform, reframing the concept of Jewish heritage and adjusting it to the 21st century.

Heritage Springs is a non-profit organization based in the United States, Israel and Ukraine. The vision of the organization is primarily the preservation of Jewish heritage, beginning in the Zakarpattia oblast

with the restoration of the former synagogue in Vilkhivtsi. In addition to this flagship project, Heritage Springs has also been active with other Jewish preservation projects including the restoration of multiple Jewish cemeteries including in Vilkhivtsi as well Sokyrnytsia in Ukraine. The organization is also currently developing a route of Jewish Heritage spanning the "Maramorosh" region of Western Ukraine, an area previously occupied by Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Poland and Romania.



Makom Sefarad

Makom Sefarad is a cultural project dedicated to facilitating spaces of dialog and coexistence through activities and programs connected to the

history and legacy of Jewish Spain.

Our activities and programs delve into the history of coexistence of the Spanish Jews alongside other peoples, and in the rich Sephardic tradition that resulted from their encounter with diversity, with the objective of identifying aspects of that tradition that might guide us as we face the challenges of life in a plural society today.

Makom Sefarad is an invitation to see opportunities for growth in encounters with difference, both as individuals and as a society.

Our Mission: To be a Point of Encounter

Makom means "place" in Hebrew. Makom Sefarad, therefore, signifies a place in Sefarad (Spain) to meet with the other, who may live, think, or be different from oneself.

In Makom, we facilitate encounters between:

People of different beliefs and cultural identities.

Jewish visitors and Jews living in Spain.

Diverse communities of Jewish Spaniards.



Routes du Judaïsme Rhénan

The European Route of Judaism on the Rhineland is a non-profit public association based in Strasbourg (France). It aims to explore, revital-

ize and promote the history and tangible and intangible heritage of Jewish communities and to create competitive cultural and touristic offers - with the possibility of including them in transnational networks through synergistic tools and services jointly presented and accessible to a wide audience with the aim of openness and transmission.

The Route is carried out in the Upper Rhine area with the participation of cities and regions, associations and museums: as Strasbourg, Colmar and Mulhouse and other sites in Alsace (France), Bade Wurtemberg with the Südlicher Oberrhein sites, ShUM cities as Mainz, Worms and Speyer in Rhineland-Palatinate (Germany), and Basel Jewish Museum (Switzerland) and Hohenems Jewish museum(Austria) which are already or in the future our partners in the project.

This tangible and intangible Jewish heritage of the Upper Rhine Valley, the cradle of Ashkenazi Judaism in the Middle Ages finds its natural place on the European Route of Jewish Heritage of the Council of Europe.

EDJC Coordinators' Meeting 2022

The EDJC Coordinators Meeting 2022 took place on March 31st in an online format. The annual meeting brought together coordinators from across Europe to share their experiences and insights from the previous year's events and to plan for the upcoming EDJC 2022.

During the meeting, the organizers presented the results of the 2021 EDJC, which showed an increase in participation and engagement despite the challenges posed by the pandemic. They also provided guidelines for the upcoming 2022 edition, which focused on the theme of Renewal.

The winning poster for the first EDJC poster contest was presented during the meeting, which captured the theme of the event and was used to promote the EDJC 2022 across Europe. This year's festival poster was created by the Red de Juderías de España - Caminos de

Sefarad and designed by Antonio Serrano (Por Fin Lunes), and can be seen alongside these lines.

Caron Sethill and Olga Lempert from the National Library of Israel were also present at the meeting to showcase the resources and content available for EDJC activities. They offered expert guidance on Jewish heritage and culture and provided access to online collections and exhibitions.

Overall, the EDJC Coordinators Meeting 2022 was a successful event that provided valuable insights and tools for coordinators to plan and execute engaging and meaningful activities for the upcoming EDJC 2022. The meeting was attended by over 70 coordinators from all over Europe, and attendees were given important updates and exciting announcements.





Activities of the European Days of Jewish Culture 2021: Dialogue

In the 2022 edition of the European Days of Jewish Culture, held once again under the ongoing pandemic situation, the number of activities and participants remained similar to the previous year. The festival was celebrated in 29 countries, with a total of 860 activities organized, and 146,866 attendees.

Although the numbers did not reach the high levels of pre-pandemic years, this edition managed to integrate new institutions and participants who implemented the festival's themes and suggestions in their activities.

The theme of Renewal was the focus of many of the activities, reflecting on the need for a renewal of Jewish culture and traditions, especially after the challenges of the pandemic. A wide range of activities, including exhibitions, concerts, conferences, and guided tours, were organized across Europe.

Overall, the 2022 edition of the European Days of Jewish Culture was a great success, attracting a significant number of participants and promoting dialogue and cultural exchange throughout Europe. While the pandemic situation is still present, the festival managed to maintain its significance and relevance, showcasing the resilience of Jewish culture and its contribution to European society.

Kick off of The European Days of Jewish Culture 2022 in Schirmeck, France.

The European Days of Jewish Culture 2022, under the theme "Renewal", kicked off on Sunday 4 September across Europe. More than 400 institutions in 30 countries are organising activities in their cities to celebrate Jewish culture from an open, diverse and pluralistic point of view.

This year, the town chosen to host the kick-off of the festival was Schirmeck in the French region of Alsace. But this election was not fortuitous, the reason behind the choice of this location is highly symbolic. In a historical act, the Sefer Torah of this small town has returned to the synagogue after an extraordinary epic journey, which began with a story of friendship between two young neighbours in Schirmeck, one Jewish and one Christian. When the war came, the two friends were separated. The young Jew did not survive the war, and his friend, Ernest Bohn, was wounded. Seeing how the Nazi troops continually desecrated the synagogue, turning it into a herd of pigs, he decided to rescue the Sefer Torah, which he had had the opportunity to see at his friend's bar mitzvah.

In early 1945, Schirmeck was liberated and Ernest Bohn had the opportunity to hand over his treasure to a Jewish chaplain (of Algerian descent) serving in the US army, Isaac Rouche. This rabbi had joined the French Resistance soldiers, who organised themselves in

Morocco under the Leclerc's orders. Since then, the rabbi carried the Sefer Torah wherever his destiny took him. His journey crossed Morocco, Algeria, Switzerland and Israel. It is through his son-in-law, who lives in Jerusalem, and who is a member of the Bnai Brith, that they came into contact again with members of the Jewish community of Alsace. The return of the Torah has become a reality, 77 years later.

Present at the ceremony were the deputy secretary general of the Council of Europe Mr Bjørn Berge, Schirmeck municipality's 1st elderwoman, the Schirmeck Synagogue Association President Mr Jacques Ruch as well as Ernest Bohn's relatives. Local and national authorities, including the Chief Rabbi of the Lower Rhine and the Consul General of the USA and the consul of Morocco & the president of the Consistoire of Strasbourg were also present at the ceremony.

In order to inaugurate the European Days of Jewish Culture 2022 in the context of this historic event, representatives of the AEPJ board were also present in Schirmeck: François Moyse, President, Claude Bloch, Honorary President, Assumpció Hosta, Secretary General, Thierry Koch, representative of JECPJ-France, and Annie Sacerdoti and Claudia de Benedetti, representatives of the UCEI (Italy).

Research Society Burgenland (BFG)

After two exceptional years due to the pandemic, the visitors of this year's European Days of Jewish Culture in Burgenland on the one hand still felt a kind of uncertainty due to the Corona pandemic, which pushed the attendance figures down a bit - be it out of pure caution or last-minute cancellations due to health reasons. On the other hand, one could see from the participants who attended that they were glad to finally be able to participate in face-to-face events again. It went without saying that all events complied with the current legal regulations and that there were no cases of infection with the virus during these events.

The year 2022 was certainly outstanding from the point of view that two former synagogues were extensively restored with public funds, opened and made accessible to visitors within the framework of the EDJC. These are the former synagogues of Stadtschlaining and Kobersdorf.

This year there have been thirteen events in a total of eleven locations, whereby an exhibition in Lockenhaus-Hochstraß (by Ruth Patzelt and Hans Raimund) extended from September 4th to 25th. All other events took place on September 4th. In addition to the exhibition in Lockenhaus-Hochstraß, at which various literature on the history of the former Jewish Communities of Burgenland was presented, there were two well-attended lectures in Gattendorf (by Dr. Klaus Derks) and Frauenkirchen (by Dr. Herbert Brettl). Lectures that were combined with a guided tour through the particular former Jewish Communities were held in Oberwart (by Dr.in Ursula Mindler-Steiner) and Kobersdorf (by Dr. Hans Hagenhofer and Erwin Hausensteiner). In the case of Kobersdorf, public interest in the restored former synagogue, which was opened only in April, was particularly high. More than 250 people came to Kobersdorf on September 4th.

Guided tours took place in Mattersburg (by KR Michael Feyer), Deutschkreutz (by Dr. Adalbert Putz), Rechnitz (by Engelbert Kenyeri and Dr.in Christine Teuschler) and Güssing (by Karl-Heiz Gober, BA, MA). All in all, the audience showed great interest in the Jewish history of the respective places. Encouragingly, there was also a tendency for a younger audience to take part in the tours.

Two particular highlights took place in Eisenstadt and Stadtschlaining. In Eisenstadt, the curator of an exhibition on the history of the Jewish Communities on the territory of the Esterházy family (Sheva Kehilot), Dr. Felix Tobler, led a tour through the exhibition in Esterházy Castle. He is considered one of the leading experts on the history of the early Jewish Communities of Burgenland, not least because of his fundamental work in the context of the exhibition.

As Burgenland celebrated its 100th anniversary of being a part of Austria in 2021 and also designed a corresponding anniversary exhibition in the course of this, it was also made possible to organize a guided tour through the anniversary exhibition. The focus of the guided tour was placed on the significance of the former Jewish Communities of Burgenland from 1921 until their destruction by the NS-regime. Within the framework of this guided tour it was also

possible to visit the restored former synagogue of Stadtschlaining, which was reopened in spring.

Overall, it can be stated that the European Days of Jewish Culture in Burgenland 2022 were quite well attended. 475 people participated in the individual events.

All the events organised and coordinated by the BFG and in cooperation with local and regional partners were freely accessible to visitors.

All the events have been widely presented and announced in the social media. In addition to advertising on social media, the BFG also had flyers printed, which were distributed in the region and sent by mail to the BFG's permanent audience. The coverage in the runup to the events was excellent. A lot of the relevant media in the region have reported on this year's EDJC. Apart from announce-

ments on the biggest radio station in the province (ORF Burgenland), where there was an extensive interview with the organiser and coordinator of the EDJC in Burgenland (Michael Scheiber), the leading newspapers also informed with articles. In the week after the EDJC, the newspapers BVZ and Bezirksblätter also reported on the events. The national television was present during the events in Kobersdorf and gave a report in the evening news.

From the point of view of reporting and the number of participants, this year's European Days of Jewish Culture in Burgenland can be considered a great success. The cooperation with the local partners also worked very well again this year. The interest in these events continues to be unbroken and even rising, so that the EDJC have become well established in the former Jewish Communities of Burgenland as an integral part of the annual programme.

Jewish community of Croatia

This year's program in Croatia was rich and varied, it was attended by over 2000 visitors live, and even more through the media and social networks. Great progress has been made in cooperation with various media houses and in increasing the public interest in the rich Jewish heritage and culture, especially in Osijek, where the entire month of Jewish culture was held this year as well as it was last year.

Croatia joined the program soon after its inception, thanks to Darko Fischer, the then-president of the Jewish Community of Osijek, who recognized the importance of this event. Osijek became the first city in Croatia to mark the EDJC in 2000 by organizing various activi-

ties. Over the years, other cities in Croatia joined the program, and Osijek has continued the tradition without interruption to this day.

The Month of Jewish Culture is celebrated in Osijek, Rijeka, Split, Zagreb, and Daruvar. The program in Osijek is the most extensive, and events are organized throughout the month. The Jewish community in Osijek has a significant contribution to the development of the city, even though they make up a small part of the population now. The month-long event is attended by a diverse range of 2000 people, indicating a great public interest in Jewish culture and tradition.

The Month of Jewish Culture began with the opening of an exhibition about the Morpurgo family from Maribor at the Osijek Cultural Centre. The exhibition was followed by a concert by the Kontra















Quartet from Maribor, who gave an emotional performance of klezmer music. The program continued with a series of lectures on various topics, including Jewish genealogy, Nazi movements in Osijek during World War II, the portrait of a gentleman in an armchair, the elements of Judaism in Croatian literature, and the Jewish calendar, sculptor Oskar Nemon, and synagogues in Croatia.

History teacher Tomislav Vuković led guided walks through the city, highlighting the cultural contribution of Osijek's Jews throughout history, their role in building the city, and the persecution directed against them during the Holocaust. The Living Libraries program, held in the Museum of Personal Stories, allowed students and other citizens to speak with the participants of the Jewish Stories exhibition.

In addition to Osijek, other Croatian cities celebrated the EDJC. In Rijeka, a guided tour of the Jewish cemetery was organized, and visitors could learn about the history of the Jewish community in Rijeka. In Split, the Jewish Community of Split organized an exhi-

bition of the menorahs, an essential symbol of Jewish culture. Visitors could also learn about the Jewish community's contribution to the development of Split. In Daruvar, the program included an exhibition of the history of the Jewish community in Daruvar, which was followed by a concert by the Antiphonus Ensemble. In Zagreb, the program included a guided tour of the Jewish cemetery and a concert by the Zagreb Soloists.

In conclusion, the European Day of Jewish Culture is a significant event that celebrates Jewish culture and tradition across Europe. Croatia has been a part of this program since 2000, and the Month of Jewish Culture is celebrated in various cities in the country. The events include lectures, guided walks, exhibitions, and concerts, showcasing the Jewish community's contribution to the development of the cities in Croatia. The Krnov synagogue hosted a concert by the Gideon String Trio -Jewish Composers on Tuesday, September 6th, which was attended by 35 visitors. Meanwhile, the Polna synagogue organized a concert by Jiří Hošek and Dominika Weiss Hošková entitled Jewish Music for Two Cellos on the same day, also with 35 attendees.

On Sunday, September 11th, the synagogue in Ustek featured a performance by Aida Mujacic, a Bosnian solo singer living in the Czech Republic, who sang "The Bosnian songs in the Ladino language."

The Spalicek gallery in Prostějov held a guided tour of the exhibition "Coming back undesirable Patron Bruno Winter" on Tuesday, September 13th, led by Filip Gregor, a historian of the Prostějov Museum and the exhibition's curator.

That same day, the synagogue in Krnov hosted a discussion evening called "Days for Israel on Moravia," which was attended by 30 visitors.

Jiří Hošek and Dominika Weiss Hošková performed Jewish Music for Two Cellos in the synagogue in Úštěk on Sunday, September 18th, with 25 attendees.

Finally, on Wednesday, September 21st, the Jewish Community in Liberec organized a lecture led by Markéta Lhotová, PhD, entitled "Jews in Liberec after the Second World War."

The European Days of Jewish Culture have a long-standing history in the Czech Republic and are attended not only by members of the Jewish community, but also by the general public. Organizers hope that cultural and educational events like these will help combat anti-Semitism, hatred, and xenophobia.

The EDJC in Alsace and Belfort were coordinated, as every year, by **B'nai B'rith** in Strasbourg, relying on the initiatives taken locally by the leaders and correspondents of the **JECPJ-Alsace network**: tourist offices, museums, consistories, Jewish communities, local associations for the preservation of synagogues and cemeteries, etc., all with the support of the European Collectivity of Alsace.

70 activities were offered in 36 municipalities, from Sunday 4 September to Sunday 18 September, including 13 concerts and shows, 6 conferences, 23 guided tours, 25 open doors.

The theme "Renewal" was particularly relevant to the ongoing restoration of several synagogues in Alsace: Benfeld, Guebwiller, Hégenheim, Schirmeck and Thann. The managers of the sites and specialist speakers presented to the public the work that has just been carried out and that which is still to come. In Schirmeck, the return

of the Torah scroll to the synagogue after an absence of more than 80 years was celebrated in the presence of many personalities.

The theme "Renewal" also inspired conferences focused on Jewish practice, addressing topics such as "Pessa'h (Passover): an unceasingly renewed exit from Egypt" (Strasbourg) and "Re-Newness in Judaism and Mikweh: symbolism and practice of purification by water" (Thann).

The Mini-Festival of Jewish Music organised by the Hanau-La Petite Pierre Intercommunal Tourist Office in Bouxwiller Ingwiller, Struth and Weiterswiller, was part of these 2022 European Days of Jewish Culture and contributed to their success.

It should also be noted that the activities offered in Hegenheim were the subject of a cross-border cooperation with the Swiss Jewish Museum in Basel.

All activities attracted 4,275 participants.

The JECJ Côte d'Azur association (formerly JECPJ Alpes-Maritimes) organised for the tenth time the EDJC in Antibes, Cannes, Nice and their surroundings.

The open doors and guided tours of the Antibes synagogue, the Great Synagogue of Cannes and the Great Deloye Synagogue of Nice, programmed within the double framework of the EDJC and the European Heritage Days (17 and 18 September) were very well attended (more than 600 people in total).

For the visit of the Nice ghetto, two tours were offered, respectively in French (11 September) and, for the first time, in English (2 October).

The guided tour of the exhibition "Chagall en éditions limitées" at the Chagall Museum in Nice was also a highlight of this edition of the EDJC.

The programme of these EDJC also included a colloquium coorganised in Nice with the FSJU on the theme "Renewal". Four conferences were planned on: renewal in the Torah: renewal of the land, renewal of the body and the spirit; on the pragmatic renewal of messianic sentiment and ideologies (socialism, nationalism) in the 19th and 20th centuries; on the participation of refugee artists in the 1920s and 1930s in the renewal of art in France. This conference had to be postponed to the first quarter of 2023.

Including a stand at the Yom Hathora in Antibes (23 October), the whole programme prepared by JECJ Côte d'Azur reached 1725 visitors.

The revival of klezmer in France is the theme of a musical conference organised by the **Medem Centre** (18/10, but postponed to 24/01/2023) giving the "floor" to artists of the young klezmer generation.

The Transmosaïk Theatre Company presented (Théâtre de la Comédie Nation, 16/10) "Exilonde", a musical show and memorial act evoking the precipitous departure of the French from Algeria in 1962.

A musical reading, created by Naïma Chemoul from the book "Lettre à Antonio Saura" by Albert Cohen, was given (24/11) at the Cervantes Institute on the initiative of **Aki Estamos**.

Six members of YCWP-France organised cultural events in Paris for the 2022 edition of the EDJC.

The Museum of Jewish Art and History (MAHJ) dedicated the whole day of 4 September to the EDJC The day invited the public to discover the history and culture of the Jews of Ukraine and its borders, in all the spaces of the museum, through 9 activities for adults and young people.

The Saphir Gallery also evoked Ukraine for these days, by initiating an exhibition (4 to 30/09) entitled "Combats plasticiens". Its subject: the resistance to the horrors of war by visual artists, such as Serge Kantorowicz, or writers, such as Aharon Appelfeld, in whose

Supported by their excellent institutional partners and by a large number of associative partners, the volunteers of the JECJ-Lorraine association were able to organise more than 40 events in Metz, in addition to 6 events organised by the Lorraine coordination (Frauenberg, Sarreguemines, Verdun, Vosges, etc.). These events, which took place from 16 August to 19 January 2023, welcomed some 10,000 participants, made up of a particularly diverse public.

Thanks to a communicator and the kindness of the press, these EDJC in Metz and Lorraine were the subject of numerous articles that can be found, as well as photos and short films, on the JECJ-Lorraine Facebook page or on the website www.jecjlorraine.fr

The many partnerships encourage the diversification of the audiences. For example, the storytelling show, which was sold out (on 16 October) at the Pontiffroy Library, attracted an audience from 4 to 94 years old. Isabelle Georges' show, "Un temps ré-enchanté - Yiddish & Musicals" (17/11), delighted an eclectic audience in Montigny-lès-Metz, while the annual colloquium in partnership with the Académie Nationale de Metz provided an opportunity for in-depth publications.

One of the highlights of this year's event was inspired by the city of Metz and its Mayor, François Grosdidier, who was very present during the events. In the middle of the war, Mr Grosdidier went to Ukraine to seal a twinning between Metz and the city of Tschernvitsi, also known as "the little Jerusalem of the East". To their great













pride, shared with JECPJ-France and AEPJ, JECJ-Lorraine was identified by Ukrainian journalists who were wondering about the possibility of cooperation. Following this twinning, JECJ-Lorraine organised several joint events (2 concerts, 1 conference, 1 film, 1

dinner in the town hall); all of them were a huge success. In the eyes of JECJ-Lorraine, this collaboration with Ukraine is the most beautiful, the most European and the most symbolic achievement of the Renewal theme.

Nancy













Dedicated to the Renewal of the Jewish Community in France after the Shoah, the EDJC organised in Nancy by the JECJ-Nancy association focused on the different events that allowed the Jewish communities to rebuild and redefine themselves after the trauma they suffered.

Developing different aspects of this issue, the opening colloquium at the André Spire Centre (4 September 2022), held in the presence of the territorial authorities (city, department, region), allowed Danielle Morali (University of Lorraine and president of JECJ-Nancy) to speak on "Renewal of Jewish thought in France after 1945", the philosopher Jean-Pierre Marchand on "The new in Henri Bergson's thought", the musicologist Anny Dreyfuss Kessous on "Jewish musical heritage: from Léon Algazy, committed musicologist, to Enrico Macias, troubadour of modern times", Benjamin Farhat, Senior Lecturer (University of Paris XII), on "The schooling of Jewish students in France" and Robin Metzger Bensadoun, researcher (Uni-

versity of Strasbourg), on "Algerian Judaism in transition in the 19th century".

The Conferences at the Town Hall of Nancy (September 13) allowed us to hear Rabbi Sadia Morali (Israel), a graduate of the University of Nancy and the Rabbinical School of Paris, who presented two of the actors of the Renewal of the Jewish Community of France: Jacob Gordin and Mr. Chouchani (Hillel Perelmann). Then it was the turn of Joseph Voignac, author of a remarkable book: "Jewish and Republican: the Maimonides School ". Musical interludes given by Franck Natan (violin) and Vincent Royer (piano), musicians of the Opéra National de Lorraine, accompanied these conferences.

Finally, the Concert at the Synagogue (18 September) given by the Mizmor Chir Ensemble on a programme of Klezmer music filled the Synagogue of Nancy to capacity.

All the events in Nancy were attended by 500 participants.

Occitanie

In Montpellier, the Maimonides Institute in cooperation with the Tourist Office proposed (4/09) a visit of the medieval Mikwé followed by a visit of the medieval Jewish quarter and a conference on the "Renewal of Occitan Judaism, between medieval and contemporary times" by Michaël Iancu, president of the Institute.

Within the double framework of the EDJC and the European Heritage Days (18/09) the synagogue of Narbonne (organisation ACIN) was opened to the public.

Provence

The Heritage Department of Isle-sur-la-Sorgue organised a conference (2/09) on "From the Temple of Jerusalem to the synagogue: birth of a new Jewish place of worship?" by Claire Reggio and guided tours of the Jewish cemetery and the town's Jewry (4/09).

In the double framework of the EDJC and the European Heritage Days (18/09), the following Jewish heritage sites were opened:

- Synagogue of Avignon (18th century): guided tours
- Carpentras Synagogue (18th century, listed as a historical monument): open house with klezmer music (organised by the Association Cultuelle Israélite de Carpentras/AVPCJC and the City of Carpentras)
- Synagogue (18th century, listed) and Jewish Museum of Cavaillon: guided tours organised by the City of Cavaillon's Museums Department; on the theme of "Renewal", the Cavaillon Heritage and Museums Department also proposed an exhibition and a conference on the restoration of the Jewish wedding headdress of the Jewish Museum of Cavaillon.

- Great Breteuil Synagogue in Marseille: guided tours on the "unknown symbols of the Great Temple" (1864, classified as a historical monument); organised by the Consistoire de Marseille and the IM-MAJ/FJF Foundation
- Cemetery of the Jews of Saint-Rémy de Provence (15th century, classified as a historical monument): guided tours organised by the association Histoires Autrement, the IMMAJ/FJF Foundation and the town of Saint-Rémy

Held in Marseille, but also accessible by videoconference, the "Renewal" Colloquium (18/09) organised by the Memory Commission of B'nai B'rith France addressed several aspects of renewal through six conferences on: the Jewish-Christian dialogue, memories and the fear of forgetting, the Hebrew language, the Shoah on social networks, Israeli cuisine and its wines, and change or renewal from the perspective of psychiatry.

In Toulon, the B'nai B'rith presented (7/11) a conference by Mrs. Danièle Iancu on "the Jewish presence in Toulon and its region".

All the activities in Occitania and Provence attracted a public of 2255 people.

The Georgian Schindler Memorial was opened in Tbilisi. The memorial was placed in the newly built park, named after the Georgian Shindlers and remembrance of Holocaust, in Varketili on the initiative of "Israeli House". On the initiative of the organization, a picture of Anne Frank was painted on a 30-meter wall in the park. The memorial as well as the Georgian Shindlers' park are now part of the European Route of Jewish Heritage in Georgia. All of these activities were organized in cooperation with AEPJ.

The Israeli House presented the Biblical Route of Jewish Cultural Heritage to the general public on September 25, the Jewish New Year. The route is agreed with the European Association for the Protection and Promotion of Jewish Culture and Heritage (AEPJ) operating under the auspices of the Council of Europe, and the main route, the Jewish path of the Caucasus, is part of the EU program under the WalkEur project.

Tbilisi SInagogue Beit Rakhel

On August 25, 2022, the Tbilisi Synagogue Beit Rakhel hosted the European Days of Jewish Culture event under the theme of "Renewal," organized by Marine Solomonishvili. The event was designed for women and girls of Jewish and other ethnic minorities, with Mrs. Solomonishvili presenting on the activities of AEPJ and EDJC, as well as the National Library of Israel's efforts to preserve Jewish culture, tradition, and Torah. The participants engaged in discussions about Rosh Hashanah and autumn holidays, which were well received by the attendees. The event successfully promoted Jewish culture and heritage in Tbilisi, Georgia, particularly among women and youth, and facilitated intercultural dialogue and positive narratives through socio-cultural educational activities that support diversity. These efforts are important steps towards developing holistic national strategies to address and prevent antisemitism.

On September 12, 2022, the European Routes of Jewish Heritage and ITER VITIS organized a joint event in Tel Aviv as part of the European Days of Jewish Culture 2022 programme. The event, which was hosted by the Italian Cultural Institute, focused on innovation in kosher viticulture in Italy. The speakers included Judith Kiriaty and Uri Bar Ner of the Kiriaty Foundation, President Emanuela Panke of ITER VITIS, and Rabbi Umberto Piperno who gave a lecture on viticulture in the Jewish tradition.

During the event, Rabbi Piperno guided attendees on a virtual tour of the best Italian kosher wineries, followed by a tasting of some Italian kosher labels from Tuscany and Piedmont. The event was a collaboration between two of the Council of Europe's Cultural Routes and aimed to promote culture, tourism, heritage and land-scape across the old continent. The Cultural Routes programme has been promoting these themes for over thirty years, with 48 itineraries certified to date, including The Way of St. James and The Via Francigena. The European Routes of Jewish Heritage and ITER VITIS are finalizing a proposal for an Itinerary of Jewish gastronomy and kosher wines, which are considered deeply rooted symbols of European identity. The Azerbaijian tourist office also presented a second event on September 14 to promote the Caucasian section of the two itineraries.

The Italian XXIII edition of the European Days of Jewish Culture – Giornata Europea della Cultura Ebraica - of 2022 had as theleading city Ferrara and counted the participation of 102 locations all over the country from North to South (including the biggest islands) placed in 16 regions (out of 20).

Several hundreds of initiatives were organized mostly on Sunday, September 18th with few exceptions such as Tuscany where it was celebrated the previous week. The chosen topic "Renewal" underlined the importance of being able to adapt to ages and react in front of challenges keeping a strong dialogue with our own roots and history. Thank also to UCEI suggestions, the topic was declined in several ways: conferences, concerts, exhibitions, guided tours, theatre performance, tastings, insights, activities for kids and adults and video contributions. Italy developed its own graphic.

The Ministry of Education, the Department for European Policies at the Presidency of the Council of Ministers, the Ministry of Culture and the National Association of Italian Municipalities confirmed again their patronage together with the acknowledgement of the Council of Europe. The authorities who participated in the local initiatives were many, and the whole celebration received affectionate and important messages of good wishes and congratulations from the President of the Italian Republic Sergio Mattarella.

Ferrara, the leading city, started the program on Saturday 17th with a "Street havdala" in Via Mazzini open to the citizens and continued with a guided tour of a few stops of the ex-ghetto integrated by Israeli dances and explicative totems. The tour was followed by a Kletzmer concert (Association Musica Libera) and an exhibition of Sephardic music and songs (lyrical singer Gabriella Caselli); many people participated in the evening program asking questions, dancing and singing.

The next morning – Sunday 18th of September – the Jewish community of Ferrara hosted the official opening of the Day - also streamed - with the round table "Renewal in Judaism: Ferrara, Italy, Europe". Together with UCEI's President and Board members and MEIS' President and Director, it was also counted the presence of many local authorities such as the Prefect and the Councilor for

Culture, representatives of the Islamic community and other faiths and the President of the Contemporary History Institute, and more... The seats (around 100) were all taken.

Later in the afternoon, approximately 150 people joined the guided tours to the community spaces and synagogues that were closed to the public for many years after the earthquake of 2012. The program was integrated by the participation of various initiatives of the National Museum MEIS and the closing of the Jewish book Festival that yearly happens in the city.

In EMILIA ROMAGNA participated also Bologna, Carpi (Fossoli), Cento, Cesena, Correggio, Cortemaggiore, Finale Emilia, Lugo di Romagna, Modena, Parma, Reggio Emilia e Soragna.

In Carpi was successfully reopened to the public – for the first time after the restoration - the XVIII century synagogue.

The region CALABRIA, besides the local initiatives, joined also this year the EDJC with a series of videos from all the locations: Arena, Belvedere Marittimo, Bova Marina, Catanzaro, Cittanova, Cosenza, Cropani, Crotone, Ferruzzano, Gerace, Motta San Giovanni, Nicotera, Palmi, Piscopio, Reggio Calabria, Rende, Roccelletta di Borgia, San Floro, Santa Maria del Cedro, Soriano Calabro, Stilo, Tarsia, Vibo Valentia e Zambrone; and the following institutions: Museo Archeologico Nazionale della Sibaritide, Museo Parco Nazionale Archeologico Scolacium, Parco Archeologico Archeoderi, Museo Archeologico Nazionale di Crotone, Museo Nazionale di Vibo Valentia - Vito Capialbi Girifalco and the archeological site Vallata San Vincenzo.

It's interesting to point out a couple of articles that complain -in local newspapers- about the nonattendance of a few places that for the journalist - and not only- should have taken part in the celebrations. An important signal of regional involvement.

In CAMPANIA, due to renovation works of the synagogue of Naples, the celebration was postponed to a date to be defined.

In FRIULI VENEZIA GIULIA Gorizia, Trieste and the new entry of San Daniele took part in the celebrations with different kinds of initiatives.

LATIUM took part in the EDJC with Fiuggi and Rome.

In Rome, the Day was a success in terms of presence, participation and program that followed easily the preview timing. The Shalom.it

covered every event and initiative with articles, posts on social media and three streaming: at the museum for the presentation of the book "Shabbat Shalom" and during the panel dedicated to A.B. Yehoshua.

Very much appreciated the musical interventions of Le'Haim group. The conference had a more moderate success. The Mayor of the city – Marco Pasquali – took part in the celebration.

Also in Mantova the public was numerous and involved.

In Ostiano although it was advertised only by two local newspapers, the EDJC went very well and counted the participation of over 50 people coming even from the close regions. Unfortunately, the municipality didn't allow to visit the synagogue – Still on restoration – nor the theatre. However, the communication about the openings during the EDJC published on their website reached and attracted many people.

Despite the adhesion in MARCHE of Ancona, Fano, Jesi, Pesaro, Senigallia e Urbino, in many of them - due to the flood that hit the region in the previous days - the celebrations were postponed.

In Ancona, the Day took place regularly with the participation of many visitors both during the morning and the afternoon; during the opening were commemorated the victims of the flood.

In Urbino, the numerous visitors to the synagogue led to a late closing of the site. Great participation the Prof. Maria Luisa Moscati's conference.

In PIEMONTE Acqui Terme, Alessandria, Asti, Biella, Carmagnola, Casale Monferrato, Chieri, Cuneo, Ivrea, Mondovì, Rivalta di Bormida, Saluzzo, Torino and Vercelli took part into the EDJC.





In Casale Monferrato during the whole day between Music, books and the "renewal of a community that never stops, the number of visitors was 987. The high participation was constant from the opening ceremony throughout the whole day. The director of the "Museo di Arte e Cultura Ebraica" in front of many local authorities underlined the historical and cultural significance of the Jewish compound; her intervention was followed by the presentation of the calendar of exhibitions and artists – all related to the topic renewal - preview for the next months, a conference, a book presentation and a concert.

The region PUGLIA was present with Bari, Lecce, Oria, San Nicandro, Garganico, Taranto e Trani.

In Lecce, the Jewish Museum - supported by region Apulia, Province of Lecce, Municipality of Lecce and UCEI - in collaboration with Infotab Tours, Lecceventi, Cantine Leuci, Melograni Martino and Loft Music School offered a rich program that welcomed more than 150 visitors and included the guided tour through the Museum and the Jewish quarter, the exhibition about the Aliya Bet. There was the possibility to experience through augmented reality how the ancient synagogue and the Jewish neighbourhood looked like between the end of the XV century and the beginning of the XVI. The program ended with a theatre play called "Sara's Memories"

with a harp performance and a tasting. The councillor for Tourism and members of the City Council took part in the initiatives.

In SARDINIA the association Chenàbura Sardos Pro Israele organized in Cagliari a tour that guided many participants through the old Jewish places of the city until 1492.

In SICILY participated in the EDJC Palermo, Palermo, Trapani, Siracusa and Castroreale. In Trapani, the State Archive inaugurated the exhibition "Renewal" with its fragments from old Torah scrolls uncovered and restored and welcomed – on Sunday, September 18th - around 40 visitors. The exhibition lasted more than a month.

In TUSCANY Florence, Livorno, Pisa and Siena organized a common program shared also online on Sunday, September 11th. Monte San Savino and Pitigliano - where about 560 people participated - had initiatives on Sunday, September 18th.

In VENETO have joined Conegliano, Padova, Portobuffolè, Rovigo, Venezia, Verona, Vicenza e Vittorio Veneto. In Padova adhesion was the following: Synagogue – 150 pax, Museum - 100 pax, Cemetery - 70 pax, Conferences - 95 pax, Saturday night performance - 85 pax Institutional guests: Councillor representing the Mayor, and representatives of the Bishop and of the Prefect.

- Culinary workshops at bagel Shop



The Municipality of Torres Vedras joined the European Days of Jewish Culture on the 4th of September, providing, on the afternoon of that day, a visit to some places in the town's historic center that were, for centuries, inhabited by the Jewish community.

This activity – which included a visit to the Interpretation Center of the Jewish Community of Torres Vedras – addressed subjects such as the community's daily life (simple experiences and remarkable events, as well as the vitality of the Jewish neighborhood of Torres Vedras), their relationships and affinities with the rest of the local community, and the fate of the Jewish community, after their expulsion (divided between the paths of the Diaspora and the integration into the Christian community).

Jewish Community of Oporto

About 5,000 people and ambassadors from Sweden, Germany, Uruguay and other countries visited the institutions of the Jewish community in the city of Porto in northern Portugal as part of the European Days of Jewish Culture, organized together with the AEPJ, the European Council of Jewish Communities, B'nai B'rith Europe, European Jewish Association and the National Library of Israel.

To mark the festive day, the Jewish Community in Porto opened the doors of community institutions to the public, including the Jewish Museum and the Holocaust Museum in the city.

The choir of the active Mekor Haim Synagogue in the city, a magnificent synagogue that is often filled with hundreds of people from thirty countries, sang for the visitors some of the best traditional Jewish songs and the visitors were even invited to an exhibition of paintings and a kosher Israeli meal at the local Iberia restaurant.

In addition, hundreds of people were watching the film "Sefarad" that tells the story of the modern Jewish community in the city, founded in 1923 by Jews of Ashkenazi origin and one army man, Captain Barros Basto, who became "the Portuguese Dreyfus" because he was expelled from the Army to be Jewish.

Tarbut Sighet Foundation has been observing the EDJC since 2015 offering a city-wide program in Sighet and several educational programs at the various High Schools in the Maramures Region. This year we collaborated with the Maramures Heritage association from Baia Mare. This was their first-time taking part. They obtained pictures from the US Holocaust Museum in Washington D.C. and created a unique exhibit by the title "My Jewish Neighbors", placed at the Art Museum of Baia Mare. Official opening took place on September 14, 2022 with 125 people attending including city officials, academia, art students and people at large. During the month the exhibit was open, over 1000 students came to see and learn from the Tour Guide about these people.





Since 2006, the European Days of Jewish Culture have been one of the most important annual manifestations celebrating the diversity and richness of Jewish culture and heritage in Slovenia. In 2022, the EDJC were jointly organised in Maribor, Murska Sobota, Lendava, Negova and Ptuj. The Slovenian organisers of the EDJC 2022 have







organised altogether 27 activities that were attended by around 6347 visitors. The activities encompassed open door days, exhibitions and exhibition openings, guided tours, concerts, lecture, and book presentations, as well as conferences and film projections. In addition, this year we have also collaborated with the organisers of the EDJC 2022 in Osijek, Croatia, where we have presented an exhibition about the Morpurgos, the descendants of the Jews who lived in medieval Maribor. The national coordinator of the EDJC in Slovenia is the Center of Jewish Cultural Heritage Synagogue Maribor.













Jewish Cultural Center Ljubljana

From the very beginning, the European Days of Jewish Culture have been of particular importance to the Jewish Cultural Center of Ljubljana and have been prepared with special care every year.

They started the program on 31 August and 1 September, when a street performance was staged, a mini spectacle, Jewish Life in Ljubljana, on the street in front of the center. Robert Waltl has prepared the script and the text together with the extremely prolific Slovenian writer and director Vinko Moederndorfer and put it together in 8 pictures. The play is directed by the Israeli director Yonatan Esterkin. The show is co-produced with Yiddish theatre from Tel Aviv — the cast included 3 actors from Israel, 4 from Slovenia with 5 musicians also from Slovenia.

Then, on 2 September, the Jewish Cultural Center of Ljubljana unveiled a memorial Stolperschwelle in front of the Ex-Sugar Factory-Cukrarna, for the 150 Jewish refugees, mostly from Croatia, who stayed there in 1941 until their deportation to Italy. On that day the

new Synagogue was stablished on their premises; the program was led by Rabbi Alexander Grodensky and Cantor Nikola David. In the evening a Special Shabbat ceremony was organized.

From 5-21 September, the 8th House of Others Festival / Festival of Tolerance will be organized, which presents several films on topic of Holocaust, films from Israel and the diaspora, as well as several educational programs for young people, various lectures, theatre shows, a concert for adults. The program is very rich and this year it also includes several of our successful theatre performances as Seven second eternity, Birds of a kind.

In September the Jewish Cultural Center of Ljubljana will also print the first Slovenian-Hebrew-English Kabbalat Shabat, the first Jewish prayer book in the Slovenian language, of which they are extremely proud.

And to round it all off, this year they will also be opening the Holocaust in Ljubljana exhibition. So that this year, practically the whole of September will be dedicated to the European Days of Jewish Culture.

Red de Juderías de España

The European Day of Jewish Culture takes place every year on the first weekend of September with a different theme. In 2022, the theme was "Renewal". The poster for the event was submitted to a competition by the Network of Jewish Quarters in Spain and was selected from all the entries.

The theme chosen to celebrate the European Day of Jewish Culture in 35 European countries in 2022 was "Renewal", a concept woven into many aspects of Jewish life and practice, as it is in the sense of recovering the past.

On September 4, 2022, the Network of Jewish Quarters in Spain, as a member of the European Association for the Preservation and Promotion of Jewish Culture and Heritage (AEPJ), joined the European Day of Jewish Culture, a cultural event that has been organized since 2000 with the aim of highlighting the diversity and richness of Judaism and its historical importance at the local, regional and national level, with the firm intention of promoting dialogue,











recognition and cultural exchange. A concept that allows us to follow the traces and memory in those places where there was a Jewish presence, and which, despite its disappearance, still preserves today a heritage and a legacy without which we would not be able to understand the present, and whose legacy, from generation to generation, constitutes a fundamental treasure in the transmission of identity. The cities of the Network extend the Day beyond September 4, celebrating numerous activities and events throughout the month dedicated to their Jewish heritage, all sharing the celebration of the Renewal contest.

Large butterfly wings were exhibited in the most deeply rooted Jewish places in the Network cities and served as an invitation to take a picture with them and participate through Instagram in the Renewal contest, which had a prize of a trip for two people to one of the association's cities.

Ajuntament de Tàrrega / Museu Comarcal de l'Urgell

The event was divided into two days with three acts and open doors. On Saturday 3 September 193 people attended the opening ceremony and the concert. These people visited the house and most of them stayed for the 8 o'clock in the evening concert with the Halfla fiesta, and possibly there were more people who we were not able to count. The inauguration was attended by different municipal authorities as well as the Department of Culture of the Generalitat and the Diputació de Lleida. On Sunday there was a guided visit to the exhibition tragèdia al call, al call i a la casa d'Avraham xalom (Tragedy in the street, the street and the house of Avraham Xalom), which was attended by 80 people. Later, with the doors open, 50 more people visited the house. We can say that the event was well attended by the public and was a success in every sense of the word as well as a very emotional event because of the significance of recovering the figure of Avraham Xalom and doing justice to one of the most important figures of Tarrega in the 15th century.

With the relaxation of Covid restrictions, the theme of 'Renewal' seemed particularly appropriate. Careful consideration was given whether to hold Zoom, hybrid or live events,

and it was encouraging to see how many sites wanted to physically open their doors to the public again and enjoyed the flexibility that the four-month Jewish Heritage Festival from September to December offered, which also covered the National Heritage Open Days.


The BBUK main event, held on Zoom, was especially successful. Arranged in conjunction with our partner, Jewish Renaissance, Lord Alfred Dubs, who arrived in the UK, on the Kindertransport and has built an outstanding career in politics, including campaigning on behalf of refugees, and Professor Shirli Gilbert, Professor of Modern History at University College, London, discussed what lessons we have learnt from the refugees of the Holocaust and how they have rebuilt their lives to help us better understand the situation which the refugees from the Ukraine currently face?

We were heartened by the number of synagogues which chose to welcome visitors in person: such as the New West End, which attracted over 300, as did Garnethill in Glasgow, where there was a choral concert and a tour. At West London Synagogue there was an Interfaith Session on Sacred Texts; Chatham offered guided tours and home-made chicken soup; and Plymouth organised an Audio Tour of the Cemetery and a History Walk as well as two short plays performed by their members in which the BBC have expressed keen interest.

A variety of other events was also held across the country. There were guided walks and heritage trails in Edinburgh, in Yorkshire and a Streetlife Project in York and the story of a well-known bakery still active in London's East End today. Great interest was shown in the life of Disraeli and his connection with Judaism at Hughenden Manor, his home. At the Salomons Museum in Tunbridgr Wells an exhibition on the 'Astounding Inventions' of Sir David Salomons drew many visitors. Most of these events also attracted a number of non-Jewish visitors.

In addition, a series of Heritage lectures was given throughout the period and a couple of Lodges organised their own events.

The European Days of Jewish Culture 2023: Memory



We are pleased to inform you about the central theme of the next edition of the European Days of Jewish Culture 2023 festival, which will be: MEMORY.

The Festival will be held, as usual, starting on the first Sunday of September 2022, that is to say on the 3rd of September, with the possibility of extending the activities during the following months until the end of November, thus giving Coordinators and Organisers the opportunity to adapt the activities to their particular situation.

The European Days of Jewish Culture festival, which has been organised since 1999 by the AEPJ, pursues to highlight the diversity and richness of Judaism and its local, regional and national historical importance, with the firm intention of promoting dialogue, rec-

ognition and exchange through conferences, concerts, performances, guided tours and other activities, which take place simultaneously throughout the continent.



The pan-European festival of the European Days of Jewish Culture 2023 will take place in an extraordinary context and under the umbrella of an exceptional programme: the Citizens, Equality, Rights and Values programme of the European Union. The AEPJ-led European funding project has been awarded €486,760.00 for the development of this edition, which will include a face-to-face EDJC Organisers and Coordinators meeting in Paris , online training on Memory, a Remembrance seminar in the Netherlands, a photographic European exhibition in Paris, an online exhibition on thein-

ternational holocaust remembrance day, and much more. The consortium is composed of the main EDJC national coordinators and AEPJ members located in the European Community: B'nai B'rith Europe, Patronat Call de Girona, JECPJ-France, Taube Center, Tarbut Sighet, Burgenland Research Society, and Jewish Community of Lithuania. In addition, key actors in the dissemination of European Jewish memory through culture are also part of the consortium: Memorial de la Shoah, Liberation Route Europe, and MahJ.



In addition, as every year, this project will be reinforced by the collaboration with the National Library of Israel, which has acted as a means to develop all kinds of exhibition and educational materials, which have given an important added value to the festival while facilitating its celebration throughout the continent.

So far, the initiatives have been a an absolute success, with the organisation of more than 1200 activities and reaching around 220,000 participants, in more than 400 cities in 25 countries on the European continent. We want to maintain these numbers which,

although they were affected during 2020 and 2021 by the health crisis situation, have been extended and expanded with the digitisation of the festival. If 2018 and 2019 were years of growth in participating cities, activities and attendees and 2020 and 2021 were years of digital transformation and development of the more online side of the Festival, we want 2022 and 2023 to be the years of awareness, consciousness-raising and quality.

In this especial edition of 2023, centred around "Memory", we aim to keep up and improve the number of participants that follow our events, and we believe that it will be the case, thanks to an ambitious and engaging agenda of activities and the implication of key actors, such as the Memorial de la Shoah, the Mahl and the LRE Foundation. We aim to take advantage of the growth of our network of partners across Europe, many of them with initiatives with a transnational component, to deliver the EDJC 2023 Memory message to all corners of the continent. A deep and well thought-out statement, a message of reflection, sensitivity and awareness. An authentic reflection that considers to transform research, memorial sites and testimonies into practical educational tools for all parts of society in particular multipliers such as policymakers, state officials and societal leaders. In the short term, the EDJC is expected to create a motivating effect among participants that will be involved, directly or indirectly in the activities, since its nature, preparation and international component are engaging drivers to awaken interest. It has been so in the past editions of the festival and this year, with the routes, the webinars, the exposition in Paris and the thrilling range of activities that are programmed in all the cities that are taking part in this year's edition, the number of people that will be involved is expected to increase greatly.

The EDJC entails an emotional factor that will surely remain as a positive impact in each of the participants that take part in the activities foreseen and will drive a keen interest in the Jewish culture and heritage, making it visible and empowering the Jewish communities across Europe. With the theme "Memory" for the 2023 edition, many people will have the opportunity to reflect about the historical memory of Europe, including the most difficult pages of its history. But, with a constructive outlook, through historical transmission, education, art and culture, which will seek to be a call for the joint construction of a Europe, with the highest humanist values, which celebrates its diversity, looking at the past and reflecting on the future.
